Habitat for Humanity of the Mississippi Gulf Coast, headquartered in Biloxi, is the host affiliate for the 2008 Carter Project. In the fall, Waste Management will build a Carter Project house in the company's headquarters city of Houston.

"Waste Management was an important part of helping Habitat for Humanity and the Carter Work Project meet local construction recycling requirements and reach the project goal of the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design's silver certification," said Everett Bass, vice president of public sector services and community relations. "Additionally, we are proud to be the sponsor of the first green Habitat house in Minnesota. This home will be constructed in June and shows how both Waste Management and Habitat for Humanity are committed to being green in everything we do."
