Free Bulky Item Collection



Rolling Hills Estates residents may request four (4) free bulky item pickups per year (up to five items per pickup). Up to ten 32 gallon trash bags can also be accepted as a bulky item pickup.


Acceptable items include: sofas, chairs, washers, dryers, toilets, etc.

Non-acceptable items include: tires, batteries, paints, oils, construction debris, chemicals of any kind, Freon, rocks, sand, gravel, dirt, logs, carpet, hazardous, or medical waste.

Bulky items cannot exceed 8 feet in length, 4 feet in width, weigh more than 150 lbs each, or require more than two people to handle. Please call (800) 774-0222 at least 24 hours in advance of your collection day to schedule a pickup.

The materials are collected right from your front door! Common items include pool chemicals, paint products, automotive products, garden chemicals, household chemicals, and electronics.

Tips to Recycle Right

WM collects and sorts a significant number of recyclables from households across Rolling Hills Estates every day. However, many of the items placed in recycling carts are actually considered trash. Recycling contamination is caused when trash items are introduced to the recycling stream. Contaminants can include items such as hoses, wires, yard waste, and food waste. Recycling contamination has the potential to jeopardize otherwise good recyclables. For example, food or liquids placed in the recycling cart will contaminate paper and cardboard by saturating the materials and making them impossible to recycle. If it can't be recycled, it unfortunately becomes trash.

You can prevent this problem by following these simple rules to recycle right:

- **1.** Empty all bottles, cans, and paper products before recycling.
- 2. Keep food and liquids out of your recycling.
- **3.** Place items loosely in your recycle cart.

Recycling Food Waste at Home

As required by state law Senate Bill 1383 (SB 1383), Waste Management (WM) has launched an organic recycling program in partnership with the City of Rolling Hills Estates. All food scraps, food-soiled paper, and yard trimmings must be placed together in your organics cart. To help collect food scraps in your kitchen and transfer them to your organics waste cart, WM has provided each Rolling Hills Estates residential household with a kitchen food waste pail. These pails reduce the moisture and odor-causing bacteria.

How to Use Your Kitchen Food Waste Pail

- 1. Keep your food pail on the kitchen counter top or under the sink. Placing your pail in a visible area will help you remember to recycle your organics.
- 2. Place food scraps, or your leftover food-soiled paper items, directly into the pail.

 The pail can be used as is, or lined with a paper bag or newspaper. Do not use plastic bags of any type, even if they are labeled as biodegradable or compostable. Compostable cups, plates, or utensils are also not acceptable.
- Scrape food scraps and leftovers from your plate or cutting board into your pail. Spoiled or stale food from your fridge and cupboards can also be placed in the pail.
- 4. Empty your pail directly into your organics cart. DO NOT place your small food waste pail out on collection day. Only the full-size organics cart should be placed at the curb.

Minimize the use of your garbage disposal

Garbage disposals increase waste that has to be treated at wastewater treatment plants, can clog sewer lines, and increase the amount of water used in your home.



Tips for Preventing Odor and Pests

There are easy things you can do to keep your food pail and organics cart odor and pest free:

Indoors

- Avoid placing liquids inside your food pail
- Cut up citrus or bell peppers to keep smells away
- Empty your food pail every day, or every couple of days, into your organics cart
- Line your food pail with a paper bag or newspaper to reduce having to clean it out so often
- Sprinkle the inside with baking soda to help absorb moisture and smells
- Freeze or refrigerate meat, fish, and dairy scraps before adding them your organics cart on collection day

Outdoors

- Place food waste in a paper bag
- Layer items like yard trimmings, newspaper, or a soiled pizza box on the bottom of your organics cart before emptying your food waste pail
- Place your organics cart out on the curb every week for service no matter how full it is to avoid pests and bugs
- Rinse your cart as needed

Frequently Asked Questions

What is organic waste?

Organic waste is any material that is biodegradable and comes from a plant or animal except for pet waste. Pet waste should be discarded in your black lid trash cart. Organic waste consists of food scraps, food-soiled paper, and yard waste.

Why is it important to recycle my organic waste and what is SB 1383?

SB 1383 went into effect January 1, 2022, and requires all California businesses, multifamily complexes, and residents to separate organic waste from trash. This bill was passed in order to divert more food waste and yard trimmings from our landfills, which will help to further reduce greenhouse gas emissions and slow climate change. What is food-soiled paper?

Food-soiled paper are paper products that have been in contact with liquid or solid food waste and cannot be recycled into other paper products. Examples of food-soiled paper include napkins, paper plates, and cups that do not contain any plastic lining, food paper wraps, stained pizza boxes, and used coffee filters.

Why can't biodegradable or compostable plastic bags be used to line food pails?

Biodegradable and compostable plastic bags do not decompose at the same rate as food, yard waste, and food-soiled paper wrap or bags. Since organic waste is processed to create compost, fertilizers, and biofuels, using biodegradable and compostable plastic bags will result in contamination.

What happens to your organic waste when it leaves your home?

Organic waste (food waste and green waste) is sent to WM's South Valley Compost Facility where it is processed to produce high-quality, nutrient-rich compost suitable for planting or crop growth.
